

Going Live DON'T BE SHY—PERFORMANCE ART IS BACK

HE WESTERN FRONT'S LUX theatre—perhaps less a theatre than a big room—has over the years hosted readings, concerts, lectures, art openings and god knows what else. Yet one of its strongest focuses has

been as an arena for a very Vancouver institution: the mutable performance cabaret. At a typical cabaret, several "acts" will perform, sometimes badly, often

with considerable polish, and occasionally provoking something uncomfortable. One evening, two artists restaged Andy

Warhol's film Blow Job, enacting just that—to the embarrassment of those peeking behind the cardboard separating them from the audience.

It's no coincidence that the Live at the End of the Century performance festival, running through October at 12 galleries and other venues, kicks off with a performance cabaret. Organized through the grunt gallery, Live is an ambitious attempt to re-introduce the most discomfiting of art mediums to a broad public. The lineup for the cabaret, Oct. I at the Yogue Theatre, includes a who's who of past and present Vancouver performance artists: I Braineater, Jay Mac-Laughlin, Warren Arcan, Tagny


