ACCESSIBILITY

he Five-Star Community Awards provide communities of every size across Canada with opportunities to snow that they have ensured the full participation of people with disabilities. Many barriers prevent disabled people from participating fully. There is a lot we can do to change things, from social attitudes to physical designs. Some solutions are simple; others require a great deal of effort and collaboration among various groups in the community. Nineteen ninety-one is the third year of the Awards Last year, 14 communities received nation-wide recognition for their efforts in becoming more accessible to everyone.

THE AWARDS

he Five-Star Community Awards offer Canarian communities an opportunity to demonstrate their commitment to accessibility and integration and to be recognized for their accomplishments in these areas. The objectives of the program are to:

- recognize significant achievement toward integration and improved access for disabled persons in five "Star" areas: transportation, housing, employment, recreation and education;
- highlight models of programs and services that other communities can use:
- inspire more communities to find wa,s of ensuring the integration of disabled persons into community life.

A FIVE-STAR COMMUNITY AWARD

rs the highest form of recognition a ommunity can receive for its all-round accomplishments in improving accessibility and integrating persons with disabilities into community life.

A **STAR AWARD** recognizes a community's achievements in one of the five Star areas.

POPULATION CATEGORIES

ommunities' achievements will be considered in six different population categories:

- under 5,000;
- 5,000 to 20,000,
- 20,000 to 50,000;
- 50,000 to 100,000;
- 100,000 to 250,000; and
 over 250,000.
- Up to six Five-Star Community Awards may be given, one in each population category.
- Up to 30 Star Awards may be given one for each of the Star areas in each population category.
- Not all the awards will necessarily be given every year.

SELECTION PROCESS

he Awards Sclection Committee is composed of nominees of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), persons with disabilities who are involved actively in advocacy, and others who are knowledgeable about the issues. Awards will be presented in conjunction with the 1991 National Access Awareness Week.

WHO MAY APPLY?

" unicipal governments apply for awards on behalf of their entire 1 communities, Making a community accessible and integrated is a shared responsibility; no one sector or group has all the authority, all the resources or all the answers. Everyone individuals, large and small business? boards of education, voluntary organizations and the government has to get involved. If your organization is involved in community accessibility projects, get in touch with your municipagovernment to request that your initiatives be included in its application for an award

HOW TO APPLY

pplication guidebooks containing both forms and detailed instructions, may be quested from the FCM headquarters in Ottawa and from the national office of the Department of the Secretary of State in Ottawa, or its regional offices across Canada.

All Canadians have the right to full access to everything their community has to offer. People with disabilities are no exception. National Access Awareness Week, May 26 to June 1, 1991 is a chance for individuals, voluntary organizations, small businesses, corporations and governments to ask themselves "What can we do to ensure access for all persons with disabilities?" Access means more than just removing physical barriers: it also means changes in attitudes and support systems that will allow all people with visible as well as invisible disabilities (such as learning, intellectual and psychiatric) to be part of community life. Working together, national, provincial and local communities across Canada to:

Your participation is important. You can make a difference! Here are some ideas for activities in the five areas where changes are needed.

Contact your mayor to let him/her know you think it is important that buses and taxis and other modes of public transportation be made accessible to disabled persons.

Organize a seminar on barrier-free design and include real estate people, builders and people with disabilities. Volunteer to help out at a group home - you may help people live independently and make new friends too.

Encourage your employer to hire qualified persons with disabilities. When you make decisions about hiring and promotions, consider andidates with disabilities.

If you lead a youth group, such as Cubs or Brownies, make sure you include young people with disabilities.

Encourage teachers to use "Discover Together", in education kit available from the Department of the Secretary of State, to help children understand disabilities.

We are directing this letter to you in your role as Port Coquitlam's representative on the committee "Independence That's Living".

Mayor Traboulay stated in council on September 9, 1991 that the city of 'Port Coquitlam should look to a yearly project to make the city more accessible for people with disabilities. We have two legally blind children age 6 and 9 who attend Birchland Elementary. They must cross Prairie Ave. four times a day to attend school - a hazardous process even when accompanied by a parent or carrying a white cane.

Birchland's parent advisory council has already approached the RCMP and city council regarding patrols or a pedestrian controlled light at the intersection of Prairie and Toronto as there have been several near misses of children crossing there.

Perhaps now would be a good time to approach the "5 Star Committee" and in turn city council about a pedestrian controlled light. This would benefit not only our 2 visually impaired children and help them walk independently and safely to and from school. It would also benefit every Birchland student living north of Prairie, junior high students living south of Prairie and attending George Pearkes and anyone going to and from Prairie Mall. It is interesting to note there are 2 pedestrian controlled lights between Coast Meridian and Shaughnessy and none between Coast Meridian and the Pitt River.

We would appreciate your help in directing our concern to the appropriate people. Thank you.

MISSION STATEMENT: To ensure that The City of Port Coquitlam is accessible to all residents by removing physical, social and attitudinal barriers which impede full participation in all aspects of community life.

TERMS OF REFERENCE:

- 1. To advise Municipal Council, mainly through its various Council Committees, on matters presently under consideration which affect people with special needs, with special attention to public education, awareness and integration, recreation, transportation, housing, education and employment.
- 2. To respond to any matters concerning people with special needs which may be referred to the committee by council or council committees.
- 3. To monitor Municipal services and facilities and ensure that the needs of people with special needs are considered.
- 4. To work co-operatively with Municipal Departments whose activities affect people with special needs and to provide these Dept. with guidance, advice and information.
- 5. To circulate, document and keep a library of information.
- 6. To encourage and facilitate feedback through existing channels from people who have a special need.
- 7. To bring to council, issues identified by the Committee requiring action by the municipality.
- 8. To receive information from the" Independence Thats Living Committee".
