PARKS & RECREATION COMMITTEE

A meeting of the Parks & Recreation Committee was held in the Council Chambers on Wednesday, March 12th, 1986, at 3:45 p.m.

In attendance were Alderman George Laking and Alderman Mike Farnworth (Items 2 to 8)

Also in attendance were K. Janna Taylor, Parks & Recreation Director; B.R. Kirk, City Administrator (Item 1); Simon Richards & Scott Kennedy, Cornerstone Architects (Item 1).

CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

That the minutes of the meeting of the Parks & Recreation Committee held on Wednesday, February 26th, 1986, be taken as read and adopted.

Item No. 1 Wilson Centre Expansion

The Committee met with Cornerstone Architects in regard to doing working drawings for the Wilson Centre expansion. Simon Richards went over some of the projects that his company is presently engaged in. The Committee indicated that they wanted drawings to be done for the total expansion rather than for stage I. Mr. Richards agreed that this concept was sound. Attached to the minutes is information about Cornerstone Architects.

Recommendation:

- 1. That Cornerstone Architects be retained to do the working architectural drawings for the Wilson Centre expansion.
- 2. That the upset fee be \$50,000 and that it be taken from the Parks Reserve.

Alete contacted 8 senior centres in the Lower Mainland. Out of the 8 surveyed, 2 centres have 0.A.P.O. Branches meeting in their facilities.

White Rock have 2 small 0.A.P.O. branches who use the facility once a month and are charged a nominal fee of approximately \$100.00 per year. The Centre has run into similar problems as the O.A.P.O. and the Centre's activities and believe that staff now require this time slot for programming. They are in facilities.

Edmond House, in Burnaby, is the other centre used by the O.A.P.O. The O.A.P.O. use the centre twice a month, one for meetings and the other for a "social". O.A.P.O. members must also be members of Edmond House. The O.A.P.O. do not pay rent but they do make an annual donation to Edmond House.

Two centres have other seniors organizations which use their facility. At Century House there is a group made up of older members who meet once a month, on Saturday afternoons (non prime time). They rent the facility for \$12.50 a day. This also covers the use of equipment such as coffee urns, dishes etc. The executive of this group also use a small room once a month but they do not have the sole use of this room.

Confederation House has two internal organizations using the facility. One is the Van Committee, whose sole purpose is to raise funds to maintain the van which this committee purchased for Confederation House's exclusive use. The other is a group that raises funds for Confederation House equipment. The ? groups raise approximately \$10,000.00 per year, which they donate to Confederation House to administer. The purpose of these groups appear to be similar to our Expansion Fund Committee. Confederation House is in the preliminary stages of expansion. The 2 groups did request office space, however after the list of denied. These two groups were instrumental in the creation of Confederation House.

There are 0.A.P.O. branches in Burnaby and Surrey but they use private halls and have no relationship with the city run senior centres.

Two senior centres, Dogwood and Kennedy House, have provided meeting space for 0.A.P.O. groups in the past. The 0.A.P.O. group that used to meet at Dogwood now meets at the Social Rec Centre as the time slot they had at Dogwood was needed for programming. Kennedy House used to be a house and did not provide enough spaces for the 0.A.P.O. Even though they now have their new 0.A.P.O. use as they require the time for their own programming.

Maple Ridge, as you know, does not have a Senior's Centre. There is a large room in the Recreation Complex that is used by seniors. The municipality maintains the room and does not charge rental nor provide staff. The co-ordination of activities is handled by the "Elderly Citizens Recreation Association". This is a group of 19 seniors which represents various user groups, 3 of which are O.A.P.O. groups.

None of the centres contacted, provide office space for O.A.P.O. groups or any other groups using the facility. In consensus that they would not support requests from outside senior's organizations to use the facility on a regular basis. It was felt that it is confusing to the membership and that space activities.


